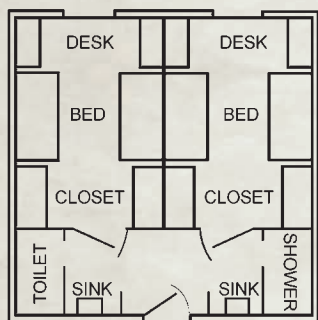
Living at UND

Bath Arrangements

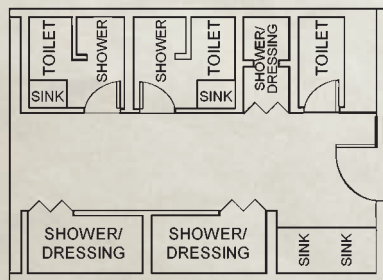
Suite Bathrooms

Private Bathrooms in Community Clusters

Computer Support

ResNet provides computer assistance free of charge to residence hall students. Services include: helping to connect to the campus network (Internet), assisting with hard drive crashes/recovery and removing viruses/spyware. All student rooms in the residence halls have wired access to the campus network (Internet). The Housing Office is in the process of installing wireless access in all student rooms. Residential Dining

Dining Services is committed to preparing well-balanced and reasonably priced meals that fit busy schedules. Residence hall students will be required to select one of four meal plans when they sign the Room and Board Contract. Students may eat in any of three dining centers on campus located in Wilkerson Hall, Squires Hall and the Memorial Union (Terrace Dining Center). Weekend meals are only served in Wilkerson. Off campus meal plans are available for students living off campus. More details regarding Dining Services can be found at www.dining.und.edu.

A convenience store is located in each complex. Wilkerson and Squires Dining Centers offer a To-Go Café. Meal plans may be used for breakfast and lunch at the Wings Café (Aerospace building at the airport).

Meal Plan Options

Unlimited Access includes \$130 Dining Dollars per semester
19 meals per week includes \$95 Dining Dollars per semester
14 meals per week includes \$60 Dining Dollars per semester
10 meals per week includes \$40 Dining Dollars per semester

Dining Dollars

All meal plans include a certain amount of Dining Dollars which can be used in all campus operated retail dining outlets and dining centers throughout the day without time restrictions. Dining Dollars expire if not used by the end of each semester.

Apartment-Style Housing

University Place is an apartment-style housing option for students with 30 or more post-high school credits. Located on University Avenue, the units offer furnished living rooms, bedrooms, and a full kitchen with refrigerator, stove and microwave. Each unit will house four students with either single or double occupancy bedrooms.

How Do I Apply?

Students requesting residence hall accommodations are required to complete the application on page 5 and return it with the \$35 non-refundable housing application fee (make check payable to UND). You may also find the housing application on-line at www.housing.und.edu.

Apply early. Applications are accepted up to one year prior to occupancy. Students will receive a confirmation letter from the Housing Office following the receipt of their application.

Room Assignment Process

Residence hall room assignments are made on a first-come, first served basis, according to the date the \$35 non-refundable housing application fee and completed housing application are received.

Room & Board Contracts for fall semester are available to sign after March 15 and are mailed from the Housing Office at that time. If you do not receive a contract, please contact the Housing Office at 701-777-4251 or find a copy on-line at www.housing.und.edu, and fax to 701-777-4298.

Students are ready to be assigned to a residence hall room when the Housing Office receives all four items listed below:

1. A completed housing application
2. The \$35 non-refundable housing application fee (make check payable to UND)
3. A signed Room & Board Contract for the semester requesting housing
4. First installment payment

Fall semester room assignments are mailed to students beginning in late May and continue until the residence halls open in August. Spring semester room assignments are mailed to students in early December. Remember, the Housing Office must have received all four items listed above before a student will receive a residence hall room assignment.

Cancellations

Students may cancel their residence hall application at any time BEFORE they have signed the Room and Board Contract. After a student has signed his/her Room and Board Contract, he/she is advised to read their contract carefully before canceling. After the first installment has been paid, approved Room and Board Contract cancellations will result in a cancellation fee. Cancellations must be submitted in writing to the Housing Office, 525 Stanford Road Stop 9029, Grand Forks, ND 58202.

Apartment Housing

UND manages approximately 800 apartments for student families and single students. Currently enrolled students with 90 credits or 23 years of age or older are eligible for student apartments. You may apply and remain on the waiting list until you are eligible for assignment. See the web site for more information.

How Do I Apply for Financial Aid?

The **Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)** is the only application required for all federal and state financial aid at the University of North Dakota. The FAFSA provides a standardized method of determining eligibility for financial assistance. The amount of financial need is the difference between the amount the federal government expects you and your family to contribute to your education and the cost of attending UND.

Apply early! Complete the FAFSA as soon after January 1 as possible. The priority date for state and federal financial aid programs is March 15, 2009 for the 2009-10 academic year.

Steps to Apply for Financial Aid

Step 1: Apply for Admission to UND

When you have been admitted and become eligible to register for classes, you will receive a Student ID number and a University e-mail address (U-Mail). All official correspondence from UND will be sent to this e-mail address.

Step 2: Apply for Scholarships

You will be automatically considered for academic honor scholarships when you have been admitted. Other scholarship and tuition waiver programs require a separate application. Application information for these programs is available at www.financialaid.und.edu. Please note priority dates!

Step 3: Apply for Financial Aid

Complete the **Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)** at www.fafsa.ed.gov. UND's school code for the FAFSA is 003005. The FAFSA should be submitted by March 1 to ensure that it is processed by the North Dakota priority date of March 15.

Step 4: You Receive a SAR

Approximately 2-4 weeks after you submit your FAFSA you will receive a Student Aid Report (SAR). The SAR is a summary of the information that you provided on the FAFSA. Review the SAR carefully! Corrections can be made at www.fafsa.ed.gov.

Step 5: You Receive a Financial Aid Award Letter

New freshmen and transfer students will receive an estimated financial aid award letter shortly after their FAFSA is processed. Official award notifications will be mailed in May. You can estimate your financial aid eligibility any time by using our online Financial Aid Estimator at www.go.und.edu or www.financialaid.und.edu.

Step 6: Complete Paperwork for a Stafford Loan

If you have accepted a Stafford Loan on your award letter, you must complete a Master Promissory Note with the lender of your choice. If you are borrowing a loan

for the first time, you must also complete Entrance Loan Counseling at www.financialaid.und.edu.

Step 7: Apply for Additional Assistance if Necessary

If you require more financial assistance than appears on your award notification, you may be eligible to apply for other loans: Federal Unsubsidized Stafford Loan, Federal Parent Loan for Undergraduate Students (PLUS), Minnesota SELF Loan, GradPLUS, or Alternative Educational Loans. General Information

 - a. College-New students are admitted according to the major they wish to pursue, to one of UND's undergraduate degree granting colleges. All students who have an "undecided" major will receive assistance from UND's Student Success Center. Once a student declares a major he/she will be enrolled in one of the undergraduate degree granting colleges.
 - b. Major-All applicants should enter a major or check the "undecided" box (see catalog for major descriptions).
16. Make sure you state your length of North Dakota residency. If you are a resident of another state, check "no" and enter the name of your state on the line which reads, "if no, in what state did you most recently reside." A student who has graduated from a Minnesota high school within the 12 month period prior to the first term of enrollment will not be required to fill out a reciprocity application form. The student will be renewed annually providing he/she has enrolled at the University for credit for any term during the academic year. For all other accepted

Minnesota residents reciprocity application forms will be **available at www.ohe.state.mn.us**.

17. If you don't know the exact test date, estimate. We need to know if you have taken the test or the date you plan to take one of the tests.

Remember to sign and date the application form and submit the \$35 non-refundable application fee (make check payable to UND).

Admission Requirements for New Freshmen

Automatic Admission will be granted to high school graduates entering as freshmen (and transfer students with less than 24 semester hours of transferable credit) who have an ACT/SAT and GPA that correspond with the following Admission Chart. In addition, students must fully meet the high school core curriculum requirements of

English (4 units),

NOTE: SAT scores consist of Critical Reading and Math scores combined. Students are encouraged to apply for admission even if their GPA and ACT/SAT do not fall in this Admission Chart. These applications will be reviewed by a committee that will consider all relevant information and extenuating circumstances to make an admission decision that is in the best interest of the student and institution. Students older than 25 are not required to submit an ACT or SAT score and should contact the Office of Admissions for more specific details.

In an action by the North Dakota State Board of Higher Education, all students who graduate from high school, whether in North Dakota or in any other state or province, in 1993 or later, are required to have completed a core curriculum in high school before entering any four-year North Dakota University System Institution.

Below is the least of courses at the secondary level which are required for admission:

- Four units of English, including the development of written and oral skills;
- Three units of Mathematics, including Algebra I and above;
- Three units of Laboratory Science, including at least one unit each in two or more of the following courses: biology, chemistry, physics, or physical science;
- Three units of Social Studies, excluding consumer education, cooperative marketing, orientation to social science, and marriage and family.

The Student Academic Standards Committee may deny applicants who meet the core curriculum requirements but are evaluated to be high risk candidates for success at UND due to a low ACT composite score or a low SAT combined score, and/or a low grade point average.

UND is entitled to admit some students who have not completed the required courses. A University committee will consider exemptions to the policy because of special circumstances.

Students who have not had the required core courses are encouraged to enroll in any of North Dakota's two-year colleges, which include Bismarck State College, North Dakota State College of Science, Minot State University-Bottineau, Lake Region State College and Williston State College. Upon successful completion of 24 transferable semester credits with a 2.0 cumulative GPA at these campuses, students are eligible for transfer to UND. These transfer students are exempt from the high school course requirements.

A student who has not graduated from high school may be admitted to the University by completing the test of General Educational Development (GED) with a minimum score of 410 or above on each exam and an overall average of 500 on the entire test. For more information regarding GED test content and registration, contact UND Testing Services at 701-777-4157. Students with a disability should contact Disability Support Services at 701-777-3425 for information.

Tests for Admission

Students applying for admission to UND are required to take one of the standardized college entrance exams. **However, students 25 years old or older are not required to submit test scores.** The American College Test (ACT) or SAT I: Reasoning Test is accepted. Standardized test scores at UND are used for scholarship and advisement, as well as admission criterion. It is recommended that students take the ACT late in their junior year or early in their senior year. **Applicants to UND are exempt from the ACT writing essay component under UND campus policy.**

Grand Forks is one of approximately 25 testing sites in the state of North Dakota for the ACT. ACT registration packets are available from UND Testing Services.

Transfer Student Information

Students transferring to the University must have maintained at least a "C" cumulative average at the colleges or universities previously attended. Certain colleges in the University require higher averages. These requirements are described in the college listings in the UND catalog. Students with unsatisfactory records, as well as students who have been asked to withdraw from other institutions due to unsatisfactory scholarship or behavior ordinarily will not be allowed to enter the University. If special permission is granted, the student is placed on academic probation.

Transfer student applicants from other colleges and universities must request that an official transcript of their academic record from each institution attended be sent to the Office of Admissions directly from the institution. Also, applicants who have attended other colleges and universities but have not earned 60 semester hours of credit acceptable toward a baccalaureate degree, must request that their high school record be forwarded directly to the Office of Admissions from the high school. Applicants who have not earned 24 transferable credits and are under the age of 25, must also have official ACT or SAT scores mailed to the Office of Admissions.

NOTE: Transfer students in the areas of athletic training, aviation, business, communication disorders, engineering, physical therapy, occupational therapy, clinical laboratory science (formerly medical technology), nursing, the School of Communication, and the College of Education and Human Development should check in the University Catalog or with the individual department for special application requirements. These departments require general admission to the University as well as acceptance to their specific programs.

Transfer Credit

In general, all college level credit attempted, excluding withdrawals, at a regionally accredited institution of higher education will be posted in transfer by UND. There are certain exemptions to this rule, and those exceptions include, but may not be limited to the following:

1. Remedial or preparatory courses
2. Credit granted for life experience by other institutions
3. Institution-based credit by examination
4. Non-degree continuing education courses

A copy of the evaluation of transfer credits will be forwarded to the student with their acceptance letter. A copy is also forwarded to the student's academic Dean who will assist in planning a program of study.

Application Deadlines

UND has a rolling admission policy. While we strongly encourage students to apply early, students may apply at any time of the year for admission as there is no application deadline. Students admitted early benefit from early fall registration opportunities. The deadline dates for appeal of an admission decision: **Fall Semester, Aug. 1; Spring Semester, December 15; Summer Session, May 15.**

Policy on Equal Opportunity
